Syllabus for Six Monthly Ph.D. Pre-Registration Course-Work in Philosophy

Preamble:

There shall be four papers in the Six- Monthly Ph.D. Pre-Registration Course-Work in Philosophy. The papers will have 5 Credits each with 20 credits as a whole. Paper-I will deal with 'Research Methodology & Computer Applications'. Paper-II will deal with 'Philosophy (Indian & Western). Paper-III will be Optional and the concerned supervisor will design the course on Philosophical Methodology in consultation with DRC. The fourth paper is Assignment where students have to prepare and submit a dissertation under the guidance of concerned supervisor. Each paper will carry 100 marks. In Paper-I, II and III, 40 marks will be assigned for Internal Assessment and 60 marks for end-term examination. The Internal Assessment will include two sessional examinations, seminar presentations, assignments etc. The Paper-IV will have 80 marks for Assignment writing and 20 marks for viva-voce. This course is intended to acquaint the students with the methodology of research with an emphasis on Philosophical Research as a whole. Moreover, the course is intended to orient the students with the traditional as well as the contemporary trends in Indian and Western Philosophy.
